

WHO WAS JAMES ATWOOD?

Rev. Jim Atwood, a Presbyterian missionary, pastor, author, and avid hunter, was a courageous advocate for changing laws and culture to prevent gun violence. After a member of his congregation was killed with a \$20 handgun, he devoted nearly 50 years to balancing the rights of responsible gun owners with the right to live free from fear. He spearheaded initiatives like the Million Mom March in 2000. His influential books included America and Its Guns – A Theological Exposé, Gundamentalism and What It is Doing to America, and Collateral Damage.

WHO IS THIS EVENT FOR AND WHAT WILL WE LEARN?
