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## Call to worship (Luke 1:46)

## Call to confession

The prophet Micah tells us that the “one of peace” will come from Bethlehem. As we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Savior, let us confess our sins and set ourselves on Christ's path.

## Prayer of confession
